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Annual Kids of Steel Triathlon was the 'best ever'

A second highlight of the day was 11-year-old Alicia Denoon from Guelph. Denoon is a cancer survivor

and the many operations and chemotherapy weakened her muscles and eyesight. Denoon did the event in a special wheel chair/bike and was all smiles at the finishing line of the Kinetico sponsored event.

"Triathlon is a sport where clean water and clean air are important to our sport," Shepley said. "Phillip Adsetts and his team from Kinetico are a perfect fit for our event."

"Kinetico believes in clean, clear water and being environmentally friendly and those are two important beliefs that C3 and Kinetico share," Barclay said.

Ontario's best elite triathletes are members of C3 and the elite team did a mini-race demonstration for

the local parents during the full day affair. C3 will be running spring and summer activities for kids and parents in both swim-bike and run.
