Candidates gearing up for Oct. 10 vote

With just weeks before eligible electors across Ontario choose the next provincial government along with their local representatives, most candidates are now in full campaign mode with the passing of the unofficial end to summer.

While the former riding of Dufferin-Peel-Wellington-Grey was a safe seat for the Progressive Conservatives, the other three candidates in the new riding of Dufferin-Caledon aren't holding back in the fight for your vote.

PC candidate Sylvia Jones says she has attended more than 150 events since being nominated in the spring. "I have held a number of focus groups on specific issues like agriculture and education and heard directly how government policies affect them and how government can serve them better."

She says the focus of the PC campaign will be "to make sure as many people as possible know what John Tory and Sylvia Jones can bring to Ontario and Dufferin-Caledon."

She sees some "very distinct differences in leadership style and experience between the PCs and other parties. "I hope that once people have a chance to look at our policies compared with the others, they will see that we offer an honest vision for Ontario and our riding."

As the local executive assistant to Tory and before him David Tilson and Ernie Eves, she finds people already know who she is and that she's running for the PCs.

"The fact that Dufferin-Caledon held the largest nomination in the province and signed up 2,500 members certainly makes my name recognition higher than if there was no nomination race."

Asked what she sees as the main campaign issues, she said she wants people to remember "how health care, agriculture and infrastructure pressures have been ignored in Dufferin-Caledon under the McGuinty Liberals. I want voters to remember that their taxpayers' dollars were being handed out without applications and due dili-

gence. And I want people to think about the kind of leader Ontario needs for the next four years."

She believes her 15 years working in the provincial government gives her a unique perspective on how government works, and even how it doesn't work. "I know the issues in Dufferin and Caledon well because I have been dealing with them. It does give me a bit of an advantage to have dealt with the problems in the constituency office."

She sees the next weeks as involving conversations with as many people as possible "about what they expect from their politicians, and convincing them that John Tory and Sylvia Jones can get the job done fairly and honestly."

She also wants to "bring some dignity and respect back to provincial politics. I think you can have debates on the issues without resorting to name-calling and mud-slinging."

Liberal candidate Elizabeth (Betsy) Hall has been knocking on doors since June. Given the absen-

teism from the riding of the current MPP John Tory, she says her knocking on their doors has given residents an opportunity to ask questions. By doing this she has helped answer questions on everyday issues for some residents and on the timing of projects such as the expansion of local highways and area schools.

In her opinion, the Conservatives take this riding for granted and won't give Dufferin-Caledon the voice it needs for education and health care.

She has brought Attorney General Michael Bryant to the area to meet with the mayors and councillors to discuss safety issues, and is also trying to bring George Smitherman, minister of health and long-term care, to discuss health concerns.

Hall says she is proud to run for the provincial Liberals. Her focus during this campaign has been to ensure the riding will receive the representation and voice it deserves with a seat at the government table.
