 "CCS providing a 'LINC' to confidence, community & Canadian culture" By Francesca Bernadowitsch



When Petra walked into Caledon Community Services two years ago, I met a timid young woman wanting to enroll in the Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) Program.

She didn't make much eye contact as her husband spoke on her behalf. I remember trying to imagine what must be going through her mind. "Will I be able to communicate? Will I make friends? Will I find a job? Will I be accepted?"

A wave of compassion washed over me. These were the exact things that my parents worried about when they emigrated from Italy 45 years ago. Like so many of our parents, they too weren't sure of their future in Canada; but they were determined to create a better life through hard work.

Over the next few months, my admiration for Petra grew. She would often visit me before class to talk about her life in Sri Lanka. I came to learn much about her. She and her brothers would often play practical jokes on one another; she missed her family and friends; her father carried her up the stairs to bed when she was ill; and her family found themselves caught between two warring groups and her quick wit ultimately saved their lives!

Fast forward two years almost to the date. That same timid young lady now burst through the LINC classroom doors to announce that she had just been promoted to manager at a local restaurant! Petra graduated from the highest LINC level offered at CCS, found meaningful employment and all the while continued working toward her ultimate goal of teaching children in her new home community.

Statistics Canada's 2006 Census reported that of the 50,605 residents living in Caledon, nearly 12,000 were immigrants and this represented a 53 per cent increase in the number of newcomers living in Caledon. These immigrants are no different than you or I; they want to make the most of their hopes and dreams. Many of our LINC students have left successful careers: Emilia, a police officer from Venezuela, with an infectious laugh and a larger than life personality; Marina, a gentle and soft-spoken physio-therapist from Brazil, who is a formidable asset to any community; and Pietro, a young doctor who has made Caledon his home and is awaiting a reunion with his wife and child. One of the major barriers for these newcomers is their lack of English and this is where LINC comes to the rescue!

Through the support of Citizenship and Immigration Canada, this summer will mark the fourth anniversary of CCS' LINC Program - Caledon's first-ever settlement service for newcomers. We offer free adult English classes on a full and part-time basis during the day and in the evening. We also provide computer labs, field trips, guest speakers and transportation and childcare services.

CCS' LINC Program has helped nearly 250 newcomers with social and economic integration by providing critical English, social and cultural skills required to transfer their professional abilities, as well as preparing them to become active, involved members of Canadian society. Due to an ever-increasing demand for English instruction for people who do not qualify for LINC, CCS has added an English (literacy-level) class in addition to English Help Cafes, led by skilled volunteers from the Caledon community.

While our clients are grateful for this support, it is truly CCS and Caledon that are enriched by their diversity and contributions to Caledon.
